Pascal Darcque, Haïdo Koukouli-Chryssanthaki, Dimitra Malamidou, Zoï Tsirtsoni - "Recent investigations at the Neolithic and Bronze Age settlement of Dikili Tash, Eastern Macedonia, Greece"



Dikili Tash is one of the prehistoric sites in Northern Greece with the longest history of investigations (more than 100 years from its first identification, 63 years from the start of systematic excavations, conducted in the frame of a Greek-French collaboration) and also the one with the longest sequence of occupation, from the mid-7th to the end of 2nd millennium BC (Early Neolithic to Late Bronze Age), in addition to Historical and Modern periods. The lecture will provide a synthetic presentation, including results from the current program started in 2019.

Pascal Darcque is Emeritus Research Director at the French National Center for Scientific Research (CNRS, UMR ArScAn). He has excavated at Dikili Tash, at Malia, Crete (Area to the North-East of the Minoan Palace), and Bassit, in Syria (Late Bronze Age levels). He has conducted also extensive work in Southern Greece, in the frame of his study on Mycenaean settlement.

Haïdo Koukouli-Chryssanthaki is Emeritus Director of Antiquities in the Greek Ministry of Culture. She has conducted research at many important archaeological sites in Eastern Macedonia, prehistoric (Dikili Tash, Kastri, Promachon-Topolnitsa, Skala Sotiros) as well as antique (Abdera, Amphipolis, Philippi).

Dimitra Malamidou is Director of the Ephorate of Antiquities in Serres. She has conducted excavations at many prehistoric settlements in Eastern Macedonia (Dikili Tash, Kryoneri, Limenaria, Ophrynio) and in Ancient Amphipolis. She recently initiated two new research projects, at Toumba Serres (jointly with the British School at Athens) and Terpni (jointly with the École française d'Athènes).

Zoï Tsirtsoni is Researcher at the French National Center for Scientific Research (CNRS, UMR ArScAn). Besides Dikili Tash, she has conducted fieldwork in different parts of Bulgaria. Her current research concerns settlement and chronology of the Aegean-Balkan area between the 7th and the 2nd millennium B.C.
